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Introduction

The Integrated Action Plan (IAP) of the Municipality of Tetovo is developed within the framework of the URBACT "NextGen YouthWork" network, designed to strengthen the connection between youth, institutions and the community in the digital era - moving towards a more inclusive and innovative "Digital Youth City." Grounded in a local assessment and informed by European exchanges of good practices, the plan was co-created through the active involvement of the URBACT Local Group (ULG), which brought together young people, the Local Youth Council, municipal representatives, municipal secondary schools and NGOs. This collaboration has been essential in identifying the main challenges facing young people in Tetovo - particularly in relation to digital literacy, employability and civic engagement - and in developing coordinated actions that address these issues sustainably.

The IAP outlines a medium-term strategy organized around three interrelated domains:

- 1. Enhancing communication and participation of youth in local decision-making,
- 2. Strengthening digital and entrepreneurial skills among young people and youth workers and
- 3. Establishing monitoring and evaluation mechanisms based on data and participation.

Throughout the document, objectives, indicators and review mechanisms are clearly defined to ensure that the plan remains adaptive, transparent and accountable. The IAP aligns with existing national and municipal youth policies, builds upon initiatives previously undertaken by the Local Youth Council and promotes equal opportunities, digital inclusion and collaboration between municipal departments and external partners - positioning young people at the heart of public action and innovation in Tetovo.

1. CITY CONTEXT AND DEFINITION OF THE INITIAL PROBLEM / POLICY CHALLENGE

The municipality of Tetovo is located in the northwestern part of the Republic of Northern Macedonia, stretching from the shore of Shar Mountain and Baltepe (Honey Fortress), to the banks of the Pena River on Shar Mountain, in the central part of the "Poloska Kotlina". Today, the municipality of Tetovo occupies a space of 261.89 km² and together with the newly created municipalities derived from it and which to this day gravitate towards it, that area is 1,080 km², with an altitude of 460 – 2747 m. Tetovo's geostrategic position is also characterized by the fact that it is located at the intersection of international busy corridors, such as corridor 8 (passing through Tetovo) and corridor 10 (40 km, far from Tetovo).

The municipality of Tetovo has 20 settlements, one city and 19 villages.

Tetovo is also one of the five largest municipalities by population in the Republic of North Macedonia. According to the population census conducted by the State Statistical Office in 2021, the total number of resident population in the municipality of Tetovo is 84,770 inhabitants.

Statistics about Municipality of Tetovo

Based on the data listed in Table below, we note that the highest percentage of the population is between the ages of 25 and 44, which amounts to 7.9% of the total number of residents, while the lowest is between the ages of 74 and 84, from 1.2% to 2% and those over 85 are only 0.6%.

Education

In the municipality of Tetovo there are primary and secondary schools, as well as universities. There are 12 primary schools in total and the teaching takes place in Albanian, Macedonian and Turkish from the first to the ninth grade due to the different ethnicities of the students. Based on the data of Department for Public Affairs, in the 2023/2024 school year, 9603 students were registered in primary schools, while in the 2024/2025 school year we have a number of 9372 students.

There are a total of 7 secondary schools in the municipality, of which 2 are state schools and 5 are under the jurisdiction of the municipality and the teaching takes place in Albanian, Macedonian and Turkish languages.

In the municipality of Tetovo there are 5 (five) municipal high schools. These high schools address students not only from the municipality of Tetovo, but also from the 5 surrounding rural municipalities.

The Municipality of Tetovo hosts two higher education institutions where students can continue their studies:

- The State University of Tetova (SUT) structured into 11 faculties, offering 35 study programs, 93 areas of study and hosting 3 scientific research institutes.
- The South East European University (SEEU) a public private university offering studies across all three academic cycles. It provides 20 undergraduate and 25 postgraduate programs within 5 faculties.

Unemployment and employment statistics

According to data from the State Statistical Office from the 2023 Labor Force Survey, the active population in the Republic of North Macedonia is 790,440 people, of whom 687,459 are employed and 102,980 are unemployed. These data represent an overview of the development of the labor market and are disaggregated by age group and gender.

Among the unemployed, slightly more than half are women (53%), reflecting a continuing gender imbalance in the labor market. Looking at age groups, young people aged 15 to 29 make up around 20% of the unemployed, highlighting the challenges that youth face in entering the workforce. The largest share of unemployed individuals, 43%, falls within the 30 - 49 age range, while those aged 50 and above represent about 37%. These figures paint a picture of a labor market where both gender and age differences play a significant role in employment opportunities, emphasizing the need for targeted policies to support young women, young people and older workers alike.

• Industrial / employment composition

The Municipality of Tetovo has significant potential for economic development, with opportunities for investment and entrepreneurship across multiple sectors. The local economy is characterized by a mix of small and medium-sized enterprises, trade, services, agriculture and a growing interest in tourism and cultural industries. The proximity to regional markets and a strong tradition of family businesses further enhance its economic resilience.

However, employment opportunities for young people remain limited, with high levels of informality, skills mismatches and a lack of innovative industries. Many young people either migrate abroad or remain underemployed, highlighting the need for targeted policies that promote inclusive growth, attract sustainable investments and create quality jobs, particularly for youth and young women. In general, the unemployment rate is an indicator of the challenges that need to be addressed to increase employment opportunities and ensure a more sustainable development of the labor market in the country.

• Entrepreneurship

Tetovo's strategic location near Skopje and its young, dynamic population offer strong potential for development. However, infrastructure gaps, complex administrative procedures and limited technological innovation constrain business competitiveness.

Youth entrepreneurship in Tetovo remains limited, with few structured programs supporting start-ups, mentoring, or access to funding. Strengthening entrepreneurial education and digital skills would enhance youth employability and local economic resilience. The municipality, in cooperation with local, regional and national institutions, actively supports private sector growth, investment and key economic sectors.

The Employment Agency of RNM (2024) supports youth entrepreneurship for young people under 29, long-term unemployed and beneficiaries of minimum assistance, offering training in digital skills, advanced IT and employability development, implemented in partnership with relevant institutions.

Access to inclusive Infrastructure

While Tetovo offers some public and educational spaces for youth, accessibility and inclusiveness remain uneven, particularly for young women and youth from rural areas, underscoring the need for more inclusive infrastructure and safe youth spaces.

Digital competences

Technology and digitalization transform society and have a significant impact on the lives of young people. Almost 99% of young people use the Internet every day or almost every day and they see the most benefits in the possibility for social interaction and communication, education, information and leisure. Despite high internet connectivity, the level of digital competences among young people in Tetovo varies significantly, with limited opportunities for advanced ICT training and digital entrepreneurship support. Strengthening these skills is key for both employability and social inclusion.



Current state in Municipality of Tetovo

The Municipality of Tetovo has established the Local youth council, which operates independently from both the council.

In Tetovo, as in many other cities, young people have faced serious challenges in recent years, particularly due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Online schooling, social isolation, limited opportunities for sports, cultural and social activities and health concerns have all taken their toll.

This situation has led to greater self-isolation and increased dependence on phones and screens. Influenced by social media, young people now spend less time outdoors and in community spaces, while cases of cyberbullying remain high.



The role of the Local youth council is:

- networking and cooperation among youth in culture, arts, sports, science and politics;
- dynamic exchange of information and experiences;
- lobbying and advocacy initiatives;
- trainings, seminars and conferences tailored to members' needs;
- organization of debates and public forums;
- coordination of joint artistic, cultural, sports, scientific and political activities.

Beyond these activities, the Council coordinates joint projects that support youth protection and empowerment, ensuring programs that enhance well-being, personal growth and informal learning.

It encourages volunteerism and civic engagement, finances and develops safe youth spaces and infrastructure and works closely with institutions to collect, analyze and report on the situation of young people's rights. Additionally, it establishes administrative structures to address youth issues and allocates budget resources to progressively advance youth rights, supporting the creation and implementation of meaningful projects, programs and initiatives.

Through the Local youth council (LYC), young people receive guaranteed participation in order to have their voice heard and contribute to the local community.

Drafting and creation of a Local Action is intended to provide youth with opportunities for solving problems, needs and ideas and the youths to be directly involved in issues such as education, different activities in sport, cultural and social activities and volunteerism for the community. Youth can prove that spending time in front of screens on the internet can bring useful activities for communities.

The Municipality of Tetovo, together with local youth, has carried out meaningful projects to strengthen citizen participation in community life.

One of the first was the Strengthening of Municipal Councils project, supported by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and implemented by the United nation development programme (UNDP) in North Macedonia. Through this initiative, public forums were held on issues such as youth, education and local governance. The process even led to a change in the Statute of Self-Governing Units, officially recognizing forums as a tool for citizen engagement.

Within this framework, the Youth Council of Tetovo launched its first project: the restoration of its own premises. With the project elected in forums of the the project Strengthening of Municipal Councils supported by SDC, imlemented by UNDP and municipal co-financing, an unusable space was transformed into a vibrant hub where young people, NGOs and artists now meet, debate, exhibit and create. The space continues to host activities ranging from youth and mental health discussions to cultural events and poetry readings - helping young people connect, express themselves and shape their community.

We aim to activate the youth for every topic related to governance, education, sport and healthy life, where today they have their space for such activities.

During the ULG meeting, participants worked on understanding the problem and analyzing the problem tree (as shown in above picture), where participants as core problem identified two challenges as: Mental health that are caused from family problems, social network influences, bullying (physical & cyber), peer pressure / egoism, economic status / financial stress which have these consequences: anxiety and depression, aggression and behavioral issues, loss of self-confidence, risk of self-harm.




Figure 2.Problem tree




Figure 3.Problem tree

The lack of institutional support for youth stems from missing communication platforms, absence of public funds and no investment in parks or sports. Weak parent - child communication and overreliance on social media further worsen the situation. As a result, young people have no channels to reach leaders, limited opportunities for recreation, spend excessive time online and increasingly migrate in search of better prospects.

By tackling both causes and consequences, the municipality of Tetovo can create a supportive environment where young people can thrive.



Summary of institutional and existing strategies and policies

The Agency for Youth and Sports as an independent body of state administration was established in 2000 as the sole government body responsible for all aspects of the life of young people in North Macedonia.

The National Youth Strategy of the Republic of Macedonia 2023 - 2027 was adopted by the Government.

its priorities covers eight priority areas as follows:

- 1. Youth participation
- 2. Digital youth information ecosystem
- 3. Youth work
- 4. Education
- 5. Culture
- 6. Health
- 7. Entrepreneurship and pre-employment support
- 8. Security (violence)

• Alignment:

- National: Fully aligned strategic priorities with Northern Macedonia's youth legislation and broader social and economic policies, particularly in the areas of inclusion, education, capacity building, innovation, decision making and quotas for youth and women at various levels of institutional participation, including city council and parliamentary candidates.
- O Regional: Closely aligned with Western Balkans regional youth cooperation frameworks, focusing on digitalization of the services, creation of innovationhubs, youth capacity building, social inclusion and increased participation in decision-making bodies throughout the system.
- EU: Strong alignment with the EU Youth Strategy 2019
 -2027, the European Youth Goals, the Green Agenda for the Western Balkans and the EU integration process, with a focus on inclusion, education, innovation, decision-making and greater representation of youth and young women in institutions.
- **Policies covered**: Employment, education, participation, health, culture, environment and inclusion.

• Alignment:

- Local: Tailored to Tetovo's socio-economic context, addressing strategic priorities such as employment, infrastructure, education, inclusion, opportunities for youth empowerment and community engagement and participation in decision-making processes.
- National: Aligned with North Macedonia's national strategies, focusing on local economic development, employment, rural and urban development, youth inclusion, gender balance, the "leave no one behind" principle and participation in decision-making processes.
- Regional: Coordinates with Polog regional development priorities and cross-border cooperation initiatives.
- EU: Reflects EU Green Deal, UN Sustainable
 Development Goals (SDGs), gender equality, social inclusion and good governance standards.

Youth work has received increased recognition in recent years in North Macedonia, but youth workers need more support. With the adoption of the Law on Youth Participation and Youth Policies in 2020, youth work in Republic of North Macedonia was for the first time defined in a legal act and youth work is formally recognized as an occupation through the adopted standard of occupation for Youth Worker from 2018.

Youth work is mainly carried out by youth organizations and organizations for young people, as well as by the small number of youth centers at the local level that have been established so far in only 6 municipalities.

Therefore, youth work is not widely available and sufficiently sustainable and most of the institutions, young people and other stakeholders and groups in society are still not familiar with the meaning and importance of youth work.

There is also a lack of broad social promotion, as well as interinstitutional and inter-sectoral cooperation in the field of development and recognition of youth work. Based on article 16 of Law on Youth participation and youth policies, municipalities in their statutes foresee establishment of Local Youth Council.

In the municipality of Tetovo, a Local Youth Council was established with 9 members of different ethnicities, organizations, political parties and 2 members are from high schools.

The organization of the departments in the framework of the municipality of Tetovo, with relevance to youth is provided by the Department of Public Affairs, which is organized in 3 units:

- the unit for education and youth,
- o unit for sport and culture and
- o unit for social, medical and child protectio

2. SETTING OF FOCUS AND OBJECTIVES

The municipality of Tetovo has committed itself to fostering an environment where youth are empowered, engaged and equipped with the tools they need to succeed.

The Integrated Action Plan (IAP) of Tetovo serves as a strategic roadmap for meaningful, measurable change. It reflects our dedication to ensuring that young people are not only heard but also actively involved in shaping the decisions that affect their future. By 2030, Tetovo aims to:

- Improve digital literacy among youth by at least 50% until 2030, ensuring access to training in digital skills, innovation technologies and online entrepreneurship. Although a high percentage of the population in the Republic of North Macedonia is connected to the internet, comparative data show that the level of digital skills remains relatively low. Specifically, Eurostat data indicate that in 2021, only 35% of the population had basic or above-basic digital skills, compared to 54% in the European Union (latest available data). This reveals a significant digital gap, which particularly affects older and vulnerable population groups.

- Create sustainable youth and young women involvement in policymaking, ensuring inclusion in decision-making process in local government, municipal elections and possibly influencing

the same regulation in parliamentary elections, requiring at least 40% of candidates for councils to be youth (15–29) and at least 40% to be women, promoting both youth empowerment and gender equality in policymaking."

- Enhance access to youth - friendly physical and digital spaces, providing safe, inclusive environments for socialization, innovation and personal development.

This plan is not just for the youth of today - it is an investment in the leaders, innovators and changemakers of tomorrow. We invite all stakeholders to join us in this journey, as we work together to build a future where every young person in Tetovo has the opportunity to thrive.

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

Five key areas of intervention have been defined as the strategic framework for implementing the Integrated Action Plan (IAP). These areas guide the development of specific actions, help prioritize resources and ensure a coordinated response to the needs of young people. They are fully aligned with the National Youth Strategy 2023 - 2027 and the Strategic Plan for Local Economic Development of Tetovo 2023–2027 and EU Youth Strategy 2019 - 2027 providing a structured approach to youth empowerment, participation, employability, entrepreneurship and access to inclusive infrastructure.




Figure 4. Three pillars of Tetovo IAP vision

"EMPOWER, INNOVATE, THRIVE." — ALIGNS WITH THE ATTRIBUTES OF YOUTH POTENTIAL IN TETOVO.

SO1: Youth Participation is at the core of the IAP, ensuring that young people are involved in decision - making processes at the local level. Through the establishment of youth councils, forums and structured engagement mechanisms, the municipality aims to foster an environment where youth voices are heard and their ideas influence policies and community initiatives. Strengthening collaboration between youth organizations and local authorities will further promote active citizenship and leadership among young people.

SO2: Digital youth information ecosystem plays a crucial role in enhancing access to opportunities, education and services. The IAP envisions the creation of a structured digital youth information ecosystem, including digital platforms and physical youth centers, where young people can easily access information on education programs, employment opportunities, entrepreneurship support and civic engagement activities. Strengthening communication channels will ensure that youth are well-informed and can make strategic decisions for their future.



SO3: Employment Support is a key pillar of the plan, focusing on bridging the gap between education and the labor market. Initiatives such as vocational training, career counseling, internship programs and partnerships with the private sector will help young people gain relevant skills and improve their employability. By fostering collaboration with local businesses and industries, the municipality aims to create more job opportunities tailored to the evolving needs of the market.

The Integrated Action Plan is a long-term commitment to youth empowerment, aiming to create an inclusive, dynamic and opportunity-rich environment where young people in Tetovo can thrive. Through continuous collaboration with stakeholders, the municipality is dedicated to ensuring that youth have the resources, support and motivation to shape their own futures and contribute to the sustainable development of the community.

SO4: Integrated Infrastructure is essential in providing young people with spaces for socialization, innovation and creativity. The municipality plans to invest in modern youth-friendly spaces, including cultural centers, co-working hubs and sports facilities, ensuring accessibility and inclusivity for all. These spaces will serve as platforms for skill-building, networking and personal development.

SO5: Inclusive Entrepreneurship will be encouraged by offering young people the necessary tools, mentorship and financial

support to start their own businesses. The IAP aims to establish incubators, training programs and access to micro - financing, enabling young entrepreneurs to develop their ideas and contribute to the local economy. Special attention will be given to marginalized and disadvantaged youth to ensure equal opportunities in business development.

The Municipality of Tetovo recognizes the vital role that young people and youth worker play in shaping the social, economic, and cultural future of the community. Young people represent a key driving force for innovation, civic engagement, and local development. In response to the challenges they face - such as limited access to employment opportunities, development, and decision-making processes. The Integrated Action Plan (IAP) is designed to strengthen this role by creating a coordinated framework that supports youth through capacity building, inclusive programs, and stronger cooperation between the municipality, youth organizations, schools, and local stakeholders. By investing in youth and youth workers and the ecosystems they operate in, the IAP aims to improve outreach, increase youth engagement, and ensure that young people - especially those facing fewer opportunities are empowered to actively participate in community life and local decision-making processes."

6. DESCRIPTION OF THE PROCESS

Presentation of the ULG?

The Municipality of Tetovo initiated this program by establishing a Local Group to address youth-related challenges. The first meeting brought together a diverse range of 25 participants. These included representatives from the Municipality of Tetovo, the Youth Council, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), secondary schools, the Employment Service Agency, the Delinquency Council and the Municipality Council. Their involvement was crucial in ensuring that the perspectives of different institutions, organizations and community actors were taken into consideration.





Figure 5. Composition of the ULG

Throughout the meetings, all participants actively contributed by sharing their opinions on the project and presenting concrete ideas on how to identify and address the key challenges faced by young people in our community. The Municipality of Tetovo, through its staff, played a coordinating role by mapping and inviting the relevant stakeholders to be part of the ULG group. This ensured that the group was representative and inclusive. Secondary schools also contributed significantly through their representatives, who highlighted the difficulties and issues that young people face in the school environment, such as limited extracurricular opportunities, peer pressure and challenges linked to social inclusion.



Given that Tetovo is a multi-ethnic city, it was important to make sure that the ULG reflected this diversity. Representatives from different ethnic backgrounds were included in the discussions, which enriched the dialogue and made the process more representative of the city's social fabric. This inclusiveness allowed us to gather a wide range of perspectives and to better understand the different realities that young people experience in Tetovo.

In addition to the regular discussions, we organized workshops and surveys with focused groups, especially targeting young people. These sessions gave youngsters the opportunity to express their views more openly and in detail. They identified the main problems they face in their everyday lives, such as limited job opportunities, lack of adequate spaces for recreation and culture, the need for better career guidance

and challenges related to social cohesion among youth from different backgrounds. Their direct input was highly valuable in shaping the direction of our ULG activities and ensuring that the voices of young people were at the center of the process.

Through this collaborative and participatory approach, the ULG meetings in Tetovo succeeded in creating a platform where institutions, schools, NGOs, councils and young people could work together. The process not only helped us to identify pressing issues but also encouraged the development of new ideas and potential solutions to improve the lives of young people in our city.

Since its establishment, the ULG has held several meetings. During the initial meetings, participants shared insights on the most pressing challenges for young people. Utilizing tools from the URBACT manual, the group identified two major topics of concern:

- Mental health issues among youth
- Lack of institutional support for young people
- Small-Scale Actions

Beyond discussions, the ULG engaged in small-scale actions to promote youth participation. Recognizing the need for interactive and engaging sessions, the fourth ULG meeting was held in the National Park.

Participants not only discussed and prioritized community improvement initiatives using the Impact Navigator tool but also participated in a hiking tour.

This outdoor gathering fostered stronger social connections among the youth and due to its success, a similar meeting was organized the following week.

Testing Actions

In terms of Testing Actions, it was identified that acquiring small-scale equipment could help develop solutions to the challenges faced by the youth.

One critical issue is the difficulty young people encounter in securing jobs and performing well in job interviews. To address this, we propose investing in digital solutions such as Virtual Reality (VR) equipment. This technology could simulate job interview scenarios, allowing young people to practice and build confidence in managing their emotions during interviews. Such an initiative would provide significant benefits to youth employment prospects and overall development within the Municipality of Tetovo.

Impact of transnational meeting

Within the action planning network, the Munciipality of Tetovo's partner cities in-cluded Eindhoven (Netherlands), Aarhus (Denmark), Cartagena and Viladecans (Spain), Iași (Romania), Klaipėda (Lithuania), Oulu (Finland), Perugia (Italy) and Vesprem (Hungary). The project's transnational meeting and study visits provided participants with the opportunity to explore each city's good practices.

Those visits proved to be highly valuable for gaining new perspectives and learning from the experiences of other cities and partners within the network of the NextGen YouthWork. Inspired by the practices of partner cities the Muncipality of Tetovo shared the practices with ULG about digital engagement, creative participation and hybrid youth work, the concept that promotes accessibility, inclusion and adaptability.

Through virtual interaction and digital tools such as VR, virtual youth workers could mentor and support young people who rarely attended physical centers, while also expanding youth workers' reach, digital skills and the overall impact of youth engagement activities.

Among this shared practice, one idea that resonated the Municipality of Tetovo, in close collaboration with the Local Youth Council, to decide to take concrete steps toward strengthening youth participation at the local level. As a result, in September 2025, the municipality officially opened the **Youth Center** in Tetovo that has 17 members.

The space now by the Muncipality support has integrated digital components - VR equipment, laptop and printer to promote digital literacy, creative expression and civic engagement among youth by using social media profile of Youth space.

The **Youth Center** now serves as a dynamic hub for young people, offering both physical and digital environments for learning, creativity and collaboration. It is designed to host a variety of youth - led activities such as: Shark Tank Challenge, which encourages youth to present innovative and entrepreneurial ideas, youth debates, fostering critical thinking, dialogue and civic participation, art exhibition showcasing the creativity of local youth, youth forums focused on discussing priorities and future opportunities and workshops on art and recreational games.

Additionally, the ULG has identified the need for enhanced career guidance and mentorship programs to bridge the gap between education and employment. Workshops and training sessions will be organized to equip young people with essential skills such as resume building, communication and entrepreneurship. These initiatives aim to empower youth by providing them with practical knowledge and resources for their future careers.

Another critical aspect is the promotion of mental health awareness. The ULG plans to collaborate with mental health professionals to conduct awareness campaigns, counseling sessions and stress management workshops. By creating a safe space for discussion and support, we aim to help young people navigate the challenges they face more effectively. Furthermore, efforts will be made to enhance youth engagement in decision-making processes.

Establishing youth councils and forums will provide a platform for young individuals to voice their opinions and actively contribute to policy development.

By involving them in governance, we ensure that their perspectives and needs are considered in municipal strategies.

By continuing these efforts, we aim to create a sustainable support system that empowers the youth and ensures their active participation in shaping a better future for our community.
